## Public bodies - telephone numbers parliamentary briefing



Following recent announcements, debates and written answers, the **fair telecoms campaign** offers the following updated briefing to parliamentarians concerned about these matters.

- All 084 numbers are subject to a "Service Charge" which is reflected in the cost of the call and offsets the cost to the person called. Ofcom will shortly be announcing new regulations requiring the level of the Service Charge (from 2p per minute) to be declared. <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>
- All 03 numbers are charged at the same rate as calls to geographic (01/02) numbers, by regulation which applies in all cases and has 100% compliance. Migration to 03 is supported by the 034 equivalent of every 084 number being reserved for that purpose.

## When is it acceptable to charge citizens for telephone access to public services!

- HMRC has announced that by the end of summer 2013 all of its numbers will be changed from 084 to 03 - victory!<sup>2</sup>
- **DWP** has, so far, refused to acknowledge the existence of the Service Charge and shows no sign of a willingness to withdraw it. We hope that when the new enquiry lines to cover Universal Credit are announced this will have to mark the change! <sup>3</sup>
- The Department of Health introduced directions and contract revisions to prohibit use of expensive numbers by NHS providers in 2009/10. It however failed to confirm that this covers all 084 numbers. This is unquestionably true under current circumstances, and has been confirmed in parliament.<sup>4</sup>

Misrepresentation by providers and inaction by PCTs means that the misuse of 084 numbers by NHS providers continues. Ministers have repeatedly refused to intervene to defend our "national" health service.  $\frac{5}{2}$ 

Some PCTs have adopted a policy of permitting a two-tier NHS service to be offered.

The Department for Business will shortly be announcing details of its implementation of the Consumer Rights Directive. This includes a provision to prohibit use of expensive numbers by businesses for calls from customers. <sup>7</sup> Does this not set a model!
