Traders still using expensive telephone numbers - only one week left before they are breaking the law!

On 2 May we published <u>a list of traders</u> with websites quoting expensive telephone numbers for customer contact. Since then, we note that many of them have moved to comply with the law; although we do not have the resources to check every company in the UK. As we said then -

Consumer protection regulations will come into force on Friday 13 June 2014 to prohibit traders from offering telephone contact from customers without using a "basic rate" telephone number.

No 08 number is currently "basic rate". Use of 080 numbers will be permitted from 26 June 2015, when these become "freephone". Expensive numbers may be offered only as a 'secondary' option.
